Indigenous women, girls, transgender, gender-diverse, and Two-Spirit people continue to go missing and are murdered at an alarming and disproportionate rate. RED DRESS DAY - May 5

Red Dress Day was inspired by <u>Métis</u> artist Jaime Black's *REDress Project* installation, in which she hung empty, red dresses to represent missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls. Red dresses have become symbolic of the movement to end gender based violence against Indigenous women, girls and 2 Spirited people. Red Dress Day is about building awareness of the ongoing harm of gender based violence and remembering those we have lost.



MOOSE HIDE CAMPAIGN – May 16th

(Carrier First Nations), whose annual hunting trips took

MOOSE HIDE place along BC's Highway 16 between Prince George and
Prince Rupert. This highway is known as the "Highway of Tears" for

the large number of Indigenous women and girls who have gone missing or been murdered there. The Moose Hide Campaign recognizes that all forms of violence are unacceptable, regardless of gender.

May 16 is Moose Hide Campaign Day, a day when all Canadians are invited to take a stand against violence toward Indigenous women, girls, and 2S-LGBTQIA+ people. By wearing a moose hide pin and participating in Moose Hide Campaign Day, you are making a visible and meaningful commitment towards ending violence against women, children and 2 Spirited people.
